IV. OPEN SESSION - (5:09 pm)

Closed Session report – In closed session, a motion was made by Trustee Broughton, seconded by Trustee Sanchez-Fulton, to authorize President Kinnamon to amend the contract for Vice President of Administrative Services, Lisa Howell, extending through June 30, 2019, with vested benefits. The motion carried unanimously with 5 members voting in favor, 0 members voting against, 0 abstentions. Motion carried 5 to 0.

In closed session, a motion was made by Trustee O'Neill, seconded by Trustee Sanchez-Fulton, to authorize President Kinnamon to extend an offer of employment for an Interim Vice President of Student Success. The motion carried unanimously with 5 members voting in favor, 0 members voting against, 0 abstentions. Motion carried 5 to 0.

V. PUBLIC UPDATES

President Kinnamon introduced Supervisor John Benoit, who requested addressing the Board of Trustees. Supervisor Benoit thanked the trustees for the services of the COD and thanked the Board for electing to have their October Board meeting at the Mecca/Thermal campus.

Dr. Kinnamon addressed the recent tragedies at community colleges that have occurred and reported that COD is actively assessing its security and safety measures. President Kinnamon stated that the events have heightened COD's awareness and made COD staff assess COD facilities and protocols, and the COD safety team has been busy over recent weeks performing drills and updating safety plans.

G. GOVERNING BOARD

Student Trustee Escobar – Student Trustee Escobar commented that she was pleased to see the turnout for this meeting. She reported that she attending the MESA Science Day and as a result of that event, a teacher from East Valley who also attended Science Day now wants to emulate and implement this program at their school. Student Trustee Escobar reported that she attended the ASCOD tailgate party during homecoming, and apologized for being late to the Board meeting due to attending her organic chemistry class.

Trustee Broughton – Trustee Broughton thanked everyone for coming out to the Mecca/Thermal campus for the Board meeting and thanked Dr. Hall for her report. Trustee Broughton commented that she is excited at the prospect of having a College of the Desert sign placed on the highway, and thanked VP Lisa Howell for her work on that project. Trustee Broughton stressed the importance of having a college campus in that area of the valley and that the high school capture rate may be improved by having college facilities that are closer to home. Trustee Broughton thanked Supervisor Benoit for attending the meeting, and thanked the community members present. Trustee Broughton commented that she had been recently contacted by a community member going back to school to take an English class, and that the student is thrilled and

encouraged by COD instructor and the staff. She also thanked everyone who encourages the students and those of us who assist students getting back into school. Trustee Broughton commented that the publicity for this meeting was very well done, and the community was happy to hear that a meeting was being held at this location. Trustee Broughton briefly addressed the Moment of Silence that was observed regarding the recent community college tragedies.

Trustee O'Neill – Trustee O'Neill thanked everyone for coming out, especially Supervisor Benoit. Trustee O'Neill offered his congratulations to the Performing Arts Department on receiving their recent theater arts award. He thanked Tim Nakamura, Interim Director of the Public Safety Academy, for the recent Great Shakeout drill conducted on COD's campus. Trustee O'Neill stated that he is impressed with the types of programs coming through PACE program and is happy to see opportunities expanding for all students. Trustee O'Neill reported that he serves on the Health and Welfare Committee, and they are looking at providing retirees and those considering retirement more comprehensive information regarding available options. He thanked VP Diane Wirth for her role and leadership on this committee. Trustee O'Neill commented that the Job Center is a great accomplishment and that he is pleased that it is going forward. Trustee O'Neill mentioned that he recently took a trip to his hometown and recounted a conversation he had 50 years ago with a coworker who encouraged him to pursue his college education, and reaffirmed that the work COD is doing in the community will change the lives of its students.

Trustee Wilson – Trustee Wilson welcomed everyone to the Mecca campus, and thanked Supervisor Benoit for attending the meeting. Trustee Wilson acknowledged Margit F. Chiriaco Rusche and thanked her for attending tonight's meeting. On September 22, Trustee Wilson attended a Citizen's Oversight Committee meeting, and on September 23 she attended the SCRAP Gallery Exhibit at the Marks Art Gallery. Trustee Wilson reported that she sits on the COD Friends of the Library board, and they recently unveiled their new website. Trustee Wilson also serves on the JFK Memorial Foundation board which is affiliated with the Ophelia Project. Trustee Wilson thanked COD allowing the Ophelia Project to have their recent training program in the Cravens Student Success Center. On October 9, Trustee Wilson attended the Riverside County Childcare Consortium and thanked COD for hosting the event. Trustee Wilson also recently attended the Association of Community College Trustees (ACCT) Congress in San Diego, and is working on completing her trusteeship program though the Community College League of California. Trustee Wilson also reported that Jim Hummer, President of the Foundation, and his executive assistant Kippy LaFlame gave a presentation at the ACCT conference, and reported that the Foundation has led a successful campaign.

Trustee Sanchez-Fulton – Trustee Sanchez-Fulton thanked Supervisor Benoit for coming. Trustee Sanchez-Fulton congratulated the University Transfer Center team for their recent University Transfer Fair at the Hilb Building. Trustee Sanchez-Fulton reported that she attended the Palm Springs Unified Career Fair, where several COD staff members were speaking with high school students. On October 22, she participated in a college readiness trustee chat that was hosted by Palm Springs Unified, Desert Hot

Springs High School, Painted Hills Middle School, Desert Springs Middle School, and Riverside County Family Resource Center. During this event, discussions around obstacles of getting into college were done in English and Spanish. Trustee Sanchez-Fulton reported that she has spoken with many employers in the area and they are impressed with the COD employment hub. On October 9 & 10, Trustee Sanchez-Fulton attended the Southern California Latino Leadership Academy 2.0, and recently completed her AB 1234 Ethics Training. She also participated in a panel discussion sponsored by Hispanics Organized for Political Equality (HOPE) and California Women's Leadership, an organization dedicated to training young women who wish to become involved in public service. She thanked to Mayor Lupe Ramos, Councilwoman Betty Sanchez-Fulton, and several other community leaders. Trustee Sanchez-Fulton attended the Water and Energy Conference through CVEP and met members of the REAL Academy. Trustee Sanchez-Fulton stated that she met a community member whose son is in the MESA program, and she commented on how much the program has positively impacted his life. Trustee Sanchez-Fulton also briefed the Board on the Men of Color in Education Workshop that she attended along with Dr. Kinnamon during the ACCT Congress in San Diego, and Dr. Kinnamon stated that he will provide comments on that workshop during his report. Trustee Sanchez-Fulton apologized for arriving late to the Board meeting and thanked everyone for attending the meeting at the Mecca/Thermal campus.

At this time, Trustee Broughton reported that the Foundation is excited about the Job Center. There are six events planned for the year that are and both friendraisers and fundraisers, and the first event will the Welcome Back event to be held on Sunday, November 15, 4-6 pm, and will be held in the COD gymnasium. Trustee Broughton commended the Foundation and Dr. Kinnamon on their collective leadership and being responsive to the needs of our faculty and students.

Trustee Stefan – Trustee Stefan commented that she is pleased to be having the meeting at the Mecca/Thermal campus, and reported that great news will be coming during the study session. She thanked Supervisor Benoit for attending the meeting, and stated that she is pleased to see the turnout. Trustee Stefan reported that she attended the ACCT Conference in San Diego with two other trustees, and she sees that big changes are coming for community colleges, especially with reaching out to potential students in lower grade levels. Trustee Stefan reminded the trustees with regard to trustee trainings, webinars are a less expensive option and can be utilized at any time. She requested that the trustees become engaged in webinars and sharing the information with the other trustees. Trustee Stefan again welcomed everyone to the Mecca/Thermal campus.

H. SUPERINTENDENT/PRESIDENT

Dr. Kinnamon reported that he has met with representatives of the Clinton Health Care Initiatives Program to discuss a collaborative they are exploring that will address the unique needs in this community, which may include challenges for our veterans, mental health, and sexual health. They are continuing to explore the possibility of becoming partners with the Clinton Health Care Initiatives Program as a national partner, and Dr. Kinnamon would like to conduct an assessment of COD to determine the needs and resources to be utilized from their association. President Kinnamon reported that COD won its homecoming game, and with regard

to enrollment management, the deans and department chairs have been expanding the schedules and finding classroom space. Dr. Kinnamon thanked the Academic Senate president, Dr. Kelly Hall, for her work on the job center initiative, and reported that Dr. Hall also co-chairs College Planning Council and works with faculty representatives on the hiring committees.

Dr. Kinnamon reported on the Men of Color in Education session during the recent ACCT conference, where the presenter spoke about cultural differences that may not be obvious as well as how gender differences affects learning. President Kinnamon stated that it is critical that we emphasize the importance of good teaching and understanding our students.

IX. PUBLIC COMMENTS

- 1. Margit F. Chiriaco Rusche Ms. Rusche introduced the trustees to a new initiative at Coachella Valley High School, which is the Agricultural & Natural Resource Academy. As a member of the California Women for Agriculture, Ms. Rusche is requesting support from COD as well as other local colleges to develop this program and possibly collaborate on this project. Vanessa Encinias, teacher at Coachella Valley High School, reported that the Academy is currently serving 140 students and they are attempting to grow and expand, and would like to partner with local community colleges to offer students the next step into an agricultural career. There is great deal of technology and engineering involved in agricultural science, and they have been speaking with Jeff Place at COD on developing some classes.
- 2. Ernie Rios CVEP & Thermal/Oasis Community Council Mr. Rios welcomed the Board to the community and thanked the trustees and staff for their leadership. Mr. Rios informed the trustees that he graduated from COD, receiving a \$100 scholarship in the 8th grade from the Alumni Association. Several deans and counselors were instrumental in his college education, and because of their help Mr. Rios is now committed to helping youth in the Coachella Valley. With the assistance of Terry Green, a former COD dean, Mr. Rios reported that he helped to cofound a scholarship program called Pathways to Success program at the Coachella Valley Economic Partnership, which has provided over \$9 million dollars in scholarships to students in the region. COD students have received these scholarships as well.
- 3. Proclamation: International Education Week read by Vinicius Marcelino Rocha, International Club President. After reading the proclamation, Mr. Rocha thanked the COD family, the athletic team and soccer coach, his girlfriend and the International Program, and informed the trustees that his father is in the audience and is attending from Brazil.
- 4. **Proclamation: Phi Theta Kappa Week** Guillermo Becerra, Phi Theta Kappa President, and Yvonne Kintero, Phi Theta Kappa Secretary. Mr. Becerra reported that he was recently contacted by a representative of the White House Education Board

regarding a new program called "Heads Up America" that is striving to make community college free and accessible to everyone. Mr. Becerra was asked to contact President Kinnamon to host an event, invite alumni to speak, and possibly grow interest in high school students to attend college.

STUDY SESSION

Mecca/Thermal Update – Mac McGinnis, VP, MAAS Companies, Program Manager, Bond Management Offices
 <u>John Ramont</u>, Director of Fiscal Services, and
 Jessica Enders, Director of Education Centers

Mr. McGinnis introduced the presentation, which provided a complete overview of the development of the East Valley Campus at Mecca/Thermal. The project was completed in 2009 with an administration building, 4 classrooms, 1 computer classroom, restrooms, a commons area, a security office, a data room, storage, and a large parking lot. The campus will be expanded in 2016 by adding 4,320 additional square feet plus a maintenance vehicle structure, increasing the total square footage to 15,370 square feet.

Ms. Enders discussed enrollments at the East Valley campus, which was up to 1044 students in 2014-2015. Ms. Enders reported that enrollments have been steady, reporting 591 fall enrollments for the Mecca/Thermal site, and they have expanded their course offerings that include English as a Second Language Non-Credit courses. The campus now has student support services and academic support services. There will be more facility growth by Spring of 2017, with two additional classrooms, a multidisciplinary wet lab and a lab preparation room.

Mr. Ramont addressed the existing bus lines that are available through the SunLine Transit Agency to this area of the valley. Line 91 covers Indio, Coachella, Thermal, Mecca and Oasis. Line 95 covers Indio, Coachella, Mecca and North Shore. The U-Pass is a pilot project that is under development, and is being designed to provide bus services to other activities for students including employment and leisure.

Trustee Wilson asked if there will be a cafeteria or food options for the students. Ms. Enders reported that currently there are vending machines with foods that can be warmed, and they are looking into healthier options. Trustee Wilson asked about the possibility of having food trucks, and Ms. Enders stated she will explore that option. Chair Stefan and the Board thanked them for their presentation.

Trustee Wilson thanked Trustee Broughton for continuing to speak up for this area, and asked for more information about the bus program, which Mr. John Ramont reported he will provide. The Board briefly discussed community uses of the campus.

Architect Ken Salyer of HMC Architects provided the schematic design of the campus expansion, reporting that the anticipated date of completion is December 2016. Lab will be utilized for biology and chemistry, as well as some art classes. A nationally known lab planner has been instrumental in the lab design.

At this time, Larry Salas requested addressing the Board of Trustees, commenting he is grateful for what is occurring in this end of the valley, as well as having a transportation system in place.

Student Trustee Escobar stressed the importance of signage for this area, and that she is happy to hear the biology lab is coming to this area. She also stated that campus expansions are important and vital in bringing students back to the Coachella Valley.





Job Center

On September 22, the Job Center discussion group held its first meeting¹. An invitation to be part of this group was sent to the entire campus: Students, classified staff, administration, Foundation, adjunct faculty & full-time faculty. Sixteen people attended the first meeting; all campus groups were represented. Several interested individuals that were unable to attend submitted email comments and/or questions that were shared with the group.

The Group's purpose is to first determine if the proposed Job Center is a resource that would help the college to achieve its mission. Overall the Job Center concept was met with broad support and enthusiasm. The Group unanimously agrees that the concept merits further research and discussion. The Group's goal is to have a completed recommendation for this project by the end of the current semester.

This month, three trips have been or will be completed to visit Job Centers at other colleges or universities. By the end of this month, Group members will have completed tours of Job Centers at Santa Barbara City College, Mt. San Antonio College, UC Riverside, and several on-line Job Centers including University of Phoenix. The Group's next meeting is October 27, 2015.

Enrollment Management

The Enrollment Management Committee has met twice this semester, on September 25 and October 14. Dr. Martinez and I are co-chairing this committee that is charged with developing recommendations for the implementation of a comprehensive and integrated approach to managing the district's enrollments. Previous to this semester, this committee reviewed the Enrollment Management Plan proposed by the Enrollment Management Taskforce in 2013 under the leadership of Co-Chairs Tony DiSalvo and then Senate President Zerryl Becker and with the consultation of Don Berz.

The purpose of the review was to first identify which of the plan's recommended strategies have been implemented and which have not. We continue to look to the 2012 plan and ask questions such as: Are the

implemented strategies having the desired outcome? Are the plan's recommended strategies not yet implemented still viable? Are there strategies not mentioned in the plan that should be considered?

College of the Desert is in a position to receive a substantial increase in growth funding. Accordingly, the committee is examining ways to increase enrollments in the near term through scheduling classes to best meet the needs of our current students. Longer term, we must look at opportunities for reaching beyond our current student base. These are exciting times for our college but we must move forward in a measured manner so that our schedule reflects the mission of the college and focuses on student success.

Hiring Committees

On October 8, I received an email from Human Resources requesting the senate appoint faculty members to six interview committees for the following positions:

- Dean, Applied Science and Business
- Dean, Communications and Humanities
- VP, Student Learning
- VP, Student Success
- Director, Public Safety Academy
- Director, Tutoring and Academic Skills Center

Each of the six Leadership positions being filled are critical to the core of our purpose – teaching and learning. Each of these positions are directly related to academic and professional matters. As you can imagine, faculty care passionately about the work of these hiring committees and we look forward to participating in this important work.

Area D Meeting

California community colleges are divided into four areas: A, B, C, and D, for purposes of senate representation at the state level. College of the Desert is in area D along with 35 other college districts in Imperial, Los Angeles, Orange, Riverside, San Bernardino, and San Diego counties.

Each area holds 2 meetings per year to exercise the local senate voice in state senate decision making. At these meetings, local senate delegates (often the senate president, president-elect, or past president) meet to be updated on the statewide work of Academic Senate, review resolutions for the Fall Plenary Session, write new resolutions and amendments to be forwarded to the Plenary Session, and discuss issues with faculty leaders from other campuses.

College of the Desert is hosting the 2015 fall area D meeting on Saturday, October 24 from 10 a.m. – 3 p.m. in the Craven's Multi-Purpose Room. Dr. Kinnamon will be on hand to welcome the guests. A continental breakfast will be provided by our very own culinary students under the leadership of Chef Beno. Professor Jeff Place's horticulture students will provide living table centerpieces. For lunch, Julio Cruz, College of the Desert

alum and the proprietor of Burritos on Wheels, will escort the guests to the food court of the Alumni Street Fair. We think this Area meeting will be a memorable one!

SSSP-Credit, SSSP-Non Credit, BSI

These plans were approved by the All Faculty Senate on October 8, 2015.

Equity

Professor Gary Bergstrom, Reading, has been named the faculty Co-Chair of the Equity Committee. The Equity plan is scheduled for its first reading at the All Faculty Senate on October 22. This plan is on-track to be completed and submitted on time.

Bookstore

The Bookstore Advisory Committee met on October 7, 2015. The Bookstore reports the proportion of students who had their textbooks on the first day of class this semester was the highest ever. Twenty-eight students have been employed at the Bookstore this semester. Plans are underway to open a bookstore at the Indio campus, target date is May 2016.

Student Scorecard

The chancellor's office has assembled an advisory group that will review the 2015 Scorecard, which was released in March, and discuss changes to the 2016 Scorecard due to be published next year. I will be one of 4 faculty members from across the state representing the Academic Senate in Sacramento on this advisory group which meets on November 2. I will update you on this effort in my next board report.

Senate Orientation/Training

On September 29, forty-five faculty members attended a training session on Senate Roles and Responsibilities. The session included a workshop on parliamentary procedure.

Educational Technologies (Christen Smith, Professor, English as a Second Language, Chair)

The Instructional Designer Coordinator resolution was approved by the All Faculty Senate on October 8. The Faculty Association worked quickly with Human Resources and the positon was posted on October 15.

On October 12, Chair Christen Smith and Executive Director of Educational Technology Sheri Willis sent a joint message to faculty announcing that the Berger Faculty Innovation Center is now open on a daily basis. Working with Director Willis on this project has been an absolute pleasure – Thank you Sheri!

In November, faculty will be voting on a resolution to adopt Canvas as the course management system to replace Blackboard. The Online Education Initiative group has chosen Canvas as the recommended platform for delivering online classes and will be covering the costs for four years and then offering Canvas at a discounted rate thereafter. Canvas was selected for the CCC's after an extensive review by the Academic Senate CCC, and OEI Pilot schools which included administrators, faculty, and students.

Faculty Development (Zerryl Becker, Professor, Computer Information Systems, Chair)

Preparations are underway for Spring 2016 Flex. The deadline for submitting Spring Flex proposals is November 1. Proposals are accepted from faculty, staff, administrators, and members of the Board of Trustees.

The theme is *Focus on Students* and we are excited to announce that the Equity Committee and the Faculty Development Committee have teamed up to bring On Course training to College of the Desert on Friday, January 29, 2016. On Course is the premier dynamic professional development workshop for learner-centered practices that empower students to become active and responsible leading to improved student success.

New Faculty Orientation continues every Friday from 9 to 11 and is now meeting in the Faculty Innovation Center. The new automated travel procedures are working very well and the new Flex contract forms were a success. The committee is also working on a Professional Development Catalog - a project that will definitely extend into Spring semester. Sabbatical proposals were due to the Deans on October 15 and to the Sabbatical Committee on November 1.

Curriculum (Carl Farmer, Director, MESA, Chair)

In October, the Chancellor's Office submitted a report to the State Legislature identifying California colleges' delinquencies in submitting Associate Degrees for Transfer (ADT's). If a college offers a local degree in a subject that has a corresponding ADT, the college is required to submit an ADT in that subject. Ultimately, local degrees will be deactivated by the Chancellor in all disciplines with corresponding ADT's. The Chancellor's October report identified College of the Desert as the college with the most delinquent degrees in the state. Since that report, faculty and our curriculum specialist, Jojie Magbuhat have been working hard to reduce the number of delinquent degrees. With the approval of the proposed math curriculum modifications on this month's board agenda, we will be able to submit both the Biology and Chemistry ADT's to further reduce our number of delinquent ADT's.

Worth Bragging About

An important part of my job as Senate President is to be the voice of faculty and I very much enjoy the chance to do a bit of bragging on our amazing team. Prepare to be wowed by the following, which is only a partial list of faculty accomplishments so far this semester!

Chris Jones-Cage, Psychology, has authored a chapter manuscript entitled *Identifying Confounding Factors in Psychological Research* in the book Activities for Teaching Statistics and Research Methods to be published by American Psychological Association.

Professor Geoff Hagopian, Mathematics, has been selected to speak at the 43rd Annual Conference of the California Mathematics Council for Community Colleges in December on the topic of Mathematics and Computer Science in the Community College Curriculum.

Rebecca Hertsgaard, Adjunct Faculty, Social Sciences, was interviewed in September by Univision for a four-

part series on religion, science, and climate change. She has also been invited for the second year as a "table expert" at the Association of Fundraising Professionals ethics workshop.

Chemistry students have founded the first College of the Desert Chemistry club with Associate Professor Joana Ciurash, Chemistry, advising.

On October 16, the MESA club, with the assistance of the Chemistry and Biology clubs, hosted Science Day. Over ninety 5th grade students and teachers from James Monroe Elementary attended this event. Dr. Carl Farmer, Director of Mesa, thanks the 20 student volunteers, Professors Joana Ciurash, Robert Pellenbarg, Jorge Perez, and Melissa Flora, along with Glenn King and Michael Hadley from Information Systems.

With the leadership of Instructor Dorothy Anderson, Automotive, a new Light/Medium Duty Diesel Certificate has been approved by the Chancellor's office.

Professor Anthony Fesmire, Music, reports that the music department is hosting a new concert series called Jazz at the Pollock that will feature faculty, guest artists, and student jazz concerts throughout the year in the Pollock Theatre. Also, In October, the jazz studies program is hosting a jazz jam session for music students, alumni, and faculty at the Hyatt Regency in Indian Wells.

Professor Wendy Sanders, Early Childhood Education (ECE), reports that on October 2, 2015, our ECE program hosted the 19th annual ECE Conference with over 300 participants from across the Coachella Valley. The event's theme was STEM (Science, Technology, Education and Math) in Early Childhood Education.

Michael Fleischmann, Adjunct Faculty, Music, reports that the College of the Desert Symphonic band has tripled its membership in the past 2 years. Also, thanks to the work of Arts & Media faculty and staff, the newly formed College of the Desert Honor Band will be partnering with the McCallum Theatre to put on a concert in May.

Professor Donna Greene, Early Childhood Education, is leading a 'Flipping the Classroom' workgroup. Last year, Professor Green presented at three conferences on this topic, including the Community College League Innovations Conference in Boston.

Michelle Richards, Work Experience Coordinator, thanks the team of faculty and staff from across campus, for the successful launch of a new, on-line job board: College of the Desert Job Hub.

I'm assembling a discussion group around the possibility of creating a Job Center / Internship Incubator on our campus. The COD Foundation may have donors interested in finding such a resource. A few ideas put forward by the Foundation are:

- Internships: A central place on Internships both for the students to get information, but also a clearing house for business to provide opportunities for internships.
- On Campus Jobs----a central location for information for On-Campus Jobs
- Part time and full time job Placement---Providing an outreach to local employers and also a central place for Business to contact the College about employment opportunities.

These are simply ideas mentioned to me by the Foundation. No decisions have been made. I present these ideas only to provide some framework as to what this conversation will be about. Before any action is taken or decisions are made, we need to engage in a campus wide discussion about this idea. We need to ask questions such as: Is this a resource that would benefit our students, campus, and community? What might it look like? How would on-going funds be secured? How would this be the same/different from the work now being done in our Career Center and the Work Experience program? And so on.

The discussion group could have these initial dialogues. Of course this group would seek the input of the entire campus community and compile those results for further consideration.

An undertaking such as this calls for broad participation and collaborations from the early stages. Who's interested in being part of the early-stages steering committee?

The Discussion Group meets on Tuesday, September 22 from 12:30 - 1:50 in the President's Board Room. We can decide upon future meeting times during this first gathering.

Desert Community College District Board of Trustees' Meeting October 23, 2015 CODAA Report

Pay by course worked extremely well. Compliments for Lisa Howell, John Ramont and the Payroll team. CODAA had over 140 email about the pay by course 37 questions, no complaints, the rest were positive comments. The pay by course implementation and the explanation of how it works seem to have made the pay stub easier to decode as well..

Negotiations are on going. We are close to agreement on a complete overhaul of the Distance Learning portion of the contract. Since the last rewrite of this section more than 10 years ago, the college has updated technology, increased the number of online and hybrid classes and moved away from video conferencing classes. None of this was reflected in the contract. Diane Wirth and Gene Durand invited Kim Dosier to join the discussions. We are now close to wording that reflects are current reality and that will allow for regular reassessments to keep up with the velocity of change in technology. We continue to work through issues with contract wording (or lack of it) involving stipends, overlay classes, and office hours.

Speaking of office hours, adjuncts are pleased to continue to use the FRC and private office space dedicated for adjunct office hours in the Hilb during the construction of the new FRC in the Admin building and the office space in the Liberal Arts building. We are especially anxious to move to the new quarters since the A/C in the adjunct areas of the Hilb is far from functional especially in the hot weather. Maintenance has been responsive to complaints but it seems to be next to impossible to circulate air in these peripheral areas. We recognize that investing in a good fix on the current issue would not be wise use of resources but we would like to have the fans, which we used last year and which were removed at the end of Spring, returned until it is possible to move to the new facilities.

Adjunct involvement in the life of the college is at an all time high. More than 30 adjuncts are active participants or alternates on campus or Senate committees. The number of adjuncts involved in student organizations has doubled. The number of adjuncts involved in community activities in increasing the reach of the college in many ways. Adjuncts are very interested in the access that the Senate has extended to them for ongoing professional development as evidenced by Flex participation and the number of adjuncts requesting opportunities for training for teaching online and using the Faculty Innovation Center.

CODAA would like to thank Dr. Kelly Hall and the Senate for including adjuncts and their accomplishments in Senate report and making sure adjuncts are informed and included in the academic life of the college beyond just classroom.

Report to the Board of Trustees, CODFA, Pres. Denise Diamond Mtg. in Mecca, Friday, 10/23 5:00 Good evening,

The Faculty Association had a productive month with increased membership and a good turnout at our monthly meeting.

The Bargaining Team and the District met once in October. The District cancelled Oct 15th meeting and the next meeting is 11/19. The District shared data and has some responses to the Association's proposals.

The District stated that they needed direction from the Board of Trustees on salary and health and welfare proposals. The Association encourages the Board of Trustees to provide prompt direction to the District. The faculty is well informed as to the District's fiscal reporting documents, our ending balance and additional growth monies. The faculty anticipates a strong salary increase that reflects the healthy state of our growing college. Faculty do appreciate last years' bonus, and we also understand that after enduring many years of economic challenges, it is when money is applied to our salary schedule that we actually catch up to the years of a very low Cost of Living Adjustment (COLA). At least 50 of our faculty are at the top step and their salaries have stagnated for several years. Additionally, all faculty are concerned about the rising costs of health benefits.

The Health and Welfare Committee met and is moving forward to clarify retiree benefits, thanks to the attention of Michael O'Neil, the representative for the retirees. It was also suggested that a member of the Board of Trustees, be a part of this President's Committee as a nonvoting member. The group is also looking for presentations by various providers.

The Senate and the Association collaborated with the District, and the Instructional Design Coordinator position is now posted. This position will also facilitate use of the Innovation Center.

The Association has 1 Grievance related to Safety and is awaiting the District's response.

The Association has made **2 formal information requests**. One on 10/15 related to Temporary Full time positions. The 2nd request on 9/28 related to the documents of the Auxiliary Board. To date we have not received a response.

The Association participated in CCA Fall Conference in San Jose, which included a focus on Concurrent/ Dual Enrollment with state legislators. We also invited our CCA District Director to a collaborative meeting with CODAA to discuss topics of mutual interest.

We are concerned that the **Faculty Obligation Number** discrepancy may cause the college to be fined. Every month the Association reconciles its membership list with the District employee list- the District is challenged to stay updated in this area, and the number of positions posted continues to grow, which adds to this challenge.

I am available to answer any questions that you may have and appreciate the opportunity to do so.

Annual Enrollments: Mecca/Thermal




