V. OPEN SESSION

Closed Session report – Chair Sanchez-Fulton stated that no reportable action was taken in closed session.

VI. PUBLIC UPDATES

President Kinnamon discussed goals that the trustees wanted the college to pursue, one of which is outreach. Dr. Kinnamon reported that COD's capture rate is in the mid-20th percentile, and local high schools have been vocal about wanting COD to work with them. He reported that he has been in conversations with a local superintendent who has been giving presentations to the Copper Mountain College (CMC) Board of Trustees about CMC providing services here in Coachella Valley. Dr. Kinnamon stated that he wanted the trustees to be aware of this matter, and commented that COD will continue to work on outreach and collaboration with the local school districts.

Dr. Kinnamon also reported that COD has engaged in the faculty prioritization process, and will be working on faculty recruitment in the spring. The additional faculty will help in addressing students' difficulties in getting the classes they need. Dr. Kinnamon reported that he is working with deans and faculty on adding additional courses in spring for closed sections and hiring additional adjunct faculty.

Dr. Kinnamon commented on the recent tragedy in San Bernardino, and reported that COD will continue to work internally to be sure students and staff are secure. COD expresses our condolences to those directly affected.

VII. PUBLIC COMMENTS

- 1. Raziq Noorali physics major expressed concern over the lack of availability for spring semester, specifically, Physics 3A, Computer Science 8 and Computer Science 9. The lack of availability for these classes is difficult to navigate as they are critical for students to move through their majors, and not having them may force them to go to a different schools. Mr. Noorali felt there were enough faculty members to provide these necessary classes.
- 2. Slavyana Nedelcheva computer science major expressed concern over the lack of computer science courses as this major will allow her to work from home once she has children. Ms. Nedelcheva asked for more computer science professors. Her goal is to go to Stanford and she would like to get the computer science classes prior to going, and would like to attend a summer internship, which does require computer sciences classes.
- 3. Raul Correa physics major would like to minor in computer science, which he commented is a fast-growing field and is not just for stem majors. The current Physics 3A and computer science courses are not enough and should be expanded to meet student needs.
- 4. **Dr. Ellen Hardy** wanted to thank everyone for the Set In Stone Petroglyphic exhibit at the Marks Art Center. She thanked the trustees for their support over the years, as well as Dr. Lisa Soccio, Mike Hadley, Crystal Glasman, as well as many others for their help in arranging and setting up the exhibit.
- 5. **Denise Diamond** faculty member reported on Seeking Educational Equity in Diversity (SEED), an international group developed at the Center for Research on Women at Wellesley. Ms. Diamond explained the purpose of the group, its relationship to COD and COD faculty and staff members who are involved. The group discusses diversity and education, and attend trainings to come back and educate COD staff.

- G. GOVERNING BOARD

Student Trustee Escobar – Student Trustee Escobar echoed the sentiments of the students with respect to the lack of enough computer science and math classes, and remarked that it affects not only those students, but a variety of majors. Ms. Escobar reported she attended the Green Council meeting where the next steps of implementing the new recycling bins was discussed. She also attended the Christmas Secret Santa event with ASCOD, as well as the MESA meeting where elections were held. Ms. Escobar invited the trustees to attend the MESA reception in early January where MESA projects will be presented.

Trustee Stefan – Trustee Stefan reported that she attended many events over the past month. She thanked everyone at COD and community for all of the support received during her year as Board Chair. Trustee Stefan reported that she attended Children's Charity Network event where she was asked to present donated bikes to local kids, and Dr. Kinnamon attended with her to assist in the donations. Trustee Stefan congratulated and praised Dr. Hardy's recent exhibit, and reported she attended the Barry Manilow event. Trustee Stefan thanked all for making COD successful over the past year.

Trustee Broughton – Trustee Broughton commented that she appreciated the students coming to the trustees to express their concerns, which is an important part of the trustees' job. Trustee Broughton stated that computer science is an important program and hopes that ways are found to grow the program and reach out to more students. Trustee Broughton commented that she has heard from constituents about their excitement about classes being offered, as well as concern that they may not be able to get into the classes they want. She expressed concern over Dr. Hall's comments that the growth is not what they expected and there are issues to work through. Trustee Broughton reported that many community members are excited to get into the EDGE Program, and briefly addressed opportunities for high school completion and COD's reputation in the community. Trustee Broughton thanked the Foundation for all the support they give COD, and reported that she attended her last meeting as Foundation representative. Trustee Broughton briefly addressed school safety issues, and thanked all for a great year.

Trustee O'Neill – Trustee O'Neill thanked Trustee Stefan for her leadership as Board Chair this past year, and wished everyone a happy holiday season. Trustee O'Neill commented that this has been one of the most positive semesters he has experienced since working with the college and is pleased to see college continuing to make progress. Trustee O'Neill attended the Citizens of Distinction luncheon, where three students shared their life stories and five people were honored, including Pauline Larson, who is

the granddaughter of two former COD math teachers. Donna Jean Darby was also recognized for her contributions and work. Trustee O'Neill attended the recent Barry Manilow event, thanked him for his contributions. He also attended the nurse pinning yesterday.

Trustee O'Neill reported that he will be submitting his resignation from the Board today, effective December 31, 2015. He recognized his partner Frank Correia, who was in attendance, and stated that it was Mr. Correia who initially encouraged him to apply for the Board. Trustee O'Neill thanked the community for the support he received and all who encouraged him to pursue this position.

Trustee Wilson – Trustee Wilson thanked Trustee O'Neill for being her mentor on the Board. Trustee Wilson thanked Dr. Stefan for her leadership during her time as Board Chair, and stated that she is happy to serve as Board Vice Chair in the upcoming year. Trustee Wilson congratulated Dr. Hardy on the Set In Stone exhibit, and thanked the staff who assisted in setting up the exhibit. Trustee Wilson attended the recent speech tournament on campus on December 4. She is on the Ophelia Project Board, and reported that there are scholarships available for high school girls. Trustee Wilson recognized Dianne Russom for the recent Riverside County Education Consortium that was held at the child development center. She also attended the Citizens of Distinction luncheon, as well as several others.

Chair Sanchez-Fulton — Chair Sanchez-Fulton thanked Trustee O'Neill for all of his work on the Board, as well as the other trustees who reached out to her after her election three years ago. She also thanked the students, and commented that hearing the concerns of the students in today's meeting reminds the Board of their duties and responsibilities. Chair Sanchez-Fulton thanked Trustee Stefan for being instrumental in assisting in her development for her preparations of becoming Board Chair. Chair Sanchez-Fulton reported that she attended the recent Indio parade, and was pleased to see the students involved. She also attended the Public Safety Academy graduation yesterday. Other events:

- Attended the Citizens of Distinction luncheon and Barry Manilow event and thanked him for his contributions.
- Attended art reception for Dr. Hardy's exhibit on December 2. Trustees Stefan and Wilson were also in attendance, as well as Dr. Kinnamon.
- Attended the Christmas program at Shadow Hills, as well as the Indio Tamale Festival and Desert Hot Springs holiday parade with some COD students.

Chair Sanchez-Fulton stated that she is happy to hear that we are in winter intersession and was pleased to know that COD is offering a 3-day workshop in film producing for high school students. Chair Sanchez-Fulton applauded the UC Board of Regents for their decision to increase student enrollment by 5,000 in 2016-2017, and by 2,500 in years 2017-2018 and 2018-2019. This plan would also freeze tuition for the 2015-2016 and 2016-2017 academic years and phase out financial aid for non-resident students and

redirect those funds to support new California student enrollments. Chair Sanchez-Fulton wished everyone a Merry Christmas and happy New Year.

H. SUPERINTENDENT/PRESIDENT

Dr. Kinnamon recognized the outgoing Board Chair, Dr. Stefan, with a plaque, and thanked her for her leadership over the past year. President Kinnamon reported that COD is currently undergoing faculty prioritization, they will continue to improve upon the process. He thanked Dr. Annebelle Nery and Dr. Daniel Martinez and staff for all the work they performed in prioritizing faculty positions. President Kinnamon thanked Dean Leslie Young and full-time faculty for the Nurse Pinning ceremony, Dean Douglas

Redman and Security and Emergency Preparedness Director Tim Nakamura for the Public Safety Academy graduation, Dean Sheri Jones for the speech tournament, Dr. Ellen Hardy, Dean Jim Berg and Dr. Lisa Soccio for the Set In Stone exhibit, and the Foundation for the Citizens of Distinction luncheon and Barry Manilow event. President Kinnamon acknowledged the work of counseling staff, who reportedly saw 531 unduplicated students during the first three days of open registration. On December 12 the Upward Bound program assisted with students preparing over 500 bags of food for the local food bank that will go to families across the Coachella Valley. Dr. Kinnamon also acknowledged Dean Young for her leadership in Disabled Students Programs and Services (DSPS), the nursing program and kinesiology program.

Lisa Howell: Vice President Administrative Services

Water Conservation Update – COD continues to meet the state mandated 25% reduction for irrigation water and 36% reduction for domestic water. COD has not received or paid any penalties to date and are operating on a reduced irrigation schedule.

Bond Refunding Update - Credit presentations were made to Standard and Poor's and Moody's yesterday in preparation for the refunding of the College's Series B and C 2004 General Obligation Bonds. Both presentations went well and they expect to have COD's ratings available for review on or around December 28th. Pricing is scheduled for Wednesday, January 13th with closing schedule for Wednesday, February 10th.

Facilities Update - The Liberal Arts renovation is looking good they are on schedule to accommodate Institutional Effectiveness prior to start of the spring semester. Furniture is expected to arrive the week of January 18. South Annex will undergo minimal renovation and will be ready to house our TRIO programs in the spring.

Computer Replacement - 42 new faculty computers are being ordered to complete the next phase of the replacement plan per the Technology Master Plan. Faculty members were provided a choice of a desktop or laptop device with docking station. They hope to receive and have the new computers ready for faculty prior to the spring term. In addition, \$250,000 has been committed to replace technology in labs and classrooms including computers, projectors and screens.

Topic: Water Conservation Update

The college continues to meet the state mandated 25% reduction for irrigation water and 36% reduction for domestic water. We have not received or paid any penalties to date and are operating on a reduced irrigation schedule.

Topic: Bond Refunding Update

Credit presentations were made to Standard and Poor's and Moody's yesterday in preparation for the refunding of the College's Series B and C 2004 General Obligation Bonds. Both presentations went well and we expect to have our ratings available for review on or around December 28th. Pricing is scheduled for Wednesday, January 13th with closing schedule for Wednesday, February 10th.

Topic: Facilities Update

The Liberal Arts renovation is looking good and I am pleased to report we are on schedule to accommodate Institutional Effectiveness prior to start of the spring semester. Furniture is expected to arrive the week of January 18th. South Annex will undergo minimal renovation and will be ready to house our TRIO programs in the spring.

Topic: Computer Replacement

42 new faculty computers are being ordered to complete our next phase of our replacement plan per the Technology Master Plan. Faculty members were provided a choice of a desktop or laptop device with docking station. We hope to receive and have the new computers ready for faculty prior to the spring term. In addition, \$250,000 has been committed to replace technology in our labs and classrooms including computers, projectors and screens.

President, Academic Senate December 18, 2015

The fall semester is drawing to a close. It has been a semester of accomplishment and challenge. We are in an

era of growth and opportunity with exciting student success initiatives and several new faculty. At the same

time, persistent vacancies in key management positions have led to growing workloads distributed amongst

fewer and fewer people. We have all been stretched to our limits and at times the workloads have seemed

impossibly large.

This month's report begins with Committee Updates. The Senate is fortunate to have an outstanding team of

faculty leaders and I wish to recognize the dedication and efforts of the Senate Executive Committee and the

faculty representatives that have accomplished so much while continuing to put students first.

Educational Technologies (Christen Smith, Professor, English as a Second Language, Chair) The Instructional

Design Coordinator position was approved and the position has been filled. The Senate thanks Diane Wirth,

Denise Diamond, and Sheri Willis. We also welcome Donna Greene, Professor of Early Childhood Education to

the position of Instructional Design Coordinator.

Ed Tech has worked with Sheri Willis and her team implemented a successful soft opening of the Berger

Faculty Innovation Center.

Professors Christen Smith and Donna Greene will be attending the State Academic Senate's 2016 Instructional

Design and Innovation Institute in January 2016. This Institute will focus on strategies to improve student

success through curricular design and the integration of instructional technology into the classroom.

This semester the Committee has begun implementation of the Distance Education (DE) Policy approved

spring 2014. A key piece of the policy is the review of on-line course shells. In response to the enormity of this

undertaking, the Distance Education Sub-Committee has been doubled in size and there are now two teams

reviewing course shells. The goal is to have all shell reviews completed by this time next year.

Another major element of the DE policy is training for all faculty teaching on-line courses. To date, four College of the Desert faculty have completed a train-the-trainer program so that we can now complete this training in-house.

This month, the senate passed a resolution, which has been provided to you in this month's board packet, to replace Blackboard with the Canvas Learning Management System. The Online Education Initiative (OEI), a collaborative effort among California Community College (CCCs). The OEI Partnership, sponsored by the Chancellor's Office, has chosen Canvas as the recommended platform for delivering online classes and will be covering the costs for four years and then offering Canvas at a discounted rate thereafter. Canvas was selected for the CCC's after an extensive review by the Academic Senate CCC, and OEI Pilot schools which included administrators, faculty and students. The Ed Tech committee has published a "Hello Canvas Goodbye Blackboard" faculty training schedule for spring 2016. Training will be held each week of the Spring semester.

Educational Policies and Practices (Vida Rossidean, Associate Professor, Reading, Chair) California Education Code 87360 states (in part) that "hiring criteria, policies, and procedures for new faculty members shall be developed and agreed upon jointly by representatives of the governing board, and the academic senate, and approved by the governing board."

On September 10, the Committee introduced Resolution No. 5.7: Recruitment and Hiring Update AP 7120, to the All Faculty Senate for a first reading. This is a big item with many moving parts that affect several areas of the college. Two months elapsed between the first reading and the senate's vote to approve the Resolution on November 12. A great deal of work took place in the weeks between the first reading and the Senate's approval.

We are working with the administration on this matter and appreciate the cooperative spirit of Dr. Kinnamon and Diane Wirth. This item was placed on the College Planning Council Agenda of September 25. It was tabled for additional input and revision from Human Resources. Work is ongoing and I am hopeful that the AP 7120 revision will be brought before this body for approval early in the spring term.

Faculty Development (Zerryl Becker, Professor, Computer Information Systems, Chair) The Faculty Development Committee partnered with the Deans to deliver a successful New Faculty Orientation. Session topics included: First week issues, the tenure process, tutoring and the Early Advantage Alert tool, COD technology, etc.

Faculty development, BSI, SSSP, and Student Equity travel funds requests are now automated.

Flex attendance reporting has been automated. This improved tracking system has been so successful that the district, for the first time in my memory, has been able to claim the maximum FTES for every day of Flex.

Outcomes and Assessments (Bert Bitanga, Associate Professor, Architecture, Chair) Student Learning Outcomes have been automated and can now be completed on-line using a Share Point interface.

Our Accreditation visit is fall of 2017. Professor Bitanga is the Faculty co-Chair along with Dr. Nery. The Accreditation 'Dream Team' has met a couple of times this year to begin this important work. We are grateful to Mary Lou Marrujo for her invaluable support in this effort.

Curriculum (Dr. Carl Farmer, Director of Mesa, Chair) This semester the Curriculum Committee has approved 38 New Courses and 6 New Degrees (including 4 new ADTs: Philosophy AA-T, Film, TV & Electronic Media AS-T, Biology AS-T, and Chemistry AS-T)

Ninety-two courses have been updated and modified. One hundred sixty-two courses have been submitted for CID alignment with the following outcomes: 123 Approved; 12 Conditional; 20 In Progress; 7 Not Approved. The changes to the 5 Math courses (*Math 1A, 1B, 2A, 2B & 2C*) that the Board approved last October were approved by the Chancellor's Office in November.

Chinese Delegates Visit College of the Desert — The Ministry of Education (MOE) of the People's Republic of China sent a team of presidents from Vocational Colleges to the United Sates this year. The group's first visit was to community colleges in the Los Angeles area. The visitors were somewhat dissatisfied with their visit to LA colleges because they were not provided opportunities to interact with faculty nor experience real-time observations. The visitors reported that their LA hosts seemed to have lost their passions for working with students and constantly apologized for their students' level of accomplishment.

Upon hearing this report, the Deputy Consul for Education in Los Angeles contacted our own Cathy Levitt. The Deputy Consul was familiar with Dr. Levitt's extensive international work experience and knowledge of Chinese culture and business. Dr. Levitt contacted faculty in Applied Science and Business. I contacted my colleagues in Early Childhood Education and Horticulture/Plant Science while Douglas Redman made arrangements with Architecture and Automotive Technologies. With 36-hours' notice we had a plan to host twenty-four college presidents from China for the day. To put it mildly, they were blown away.

Be prepared to smile as you read the excerpt from the Chinese visitors' feedback below which was translated from Mandarin Chinese by Cathy Levitt.

In ECE, we found the secret of American innovation and responsible conduct. Children are allowed to make a mess and have fun and not use mistakes or problems as a stopping point but an opportunity to try something different. They are allowed to play with wonderful toys as long as they respect the toy, themselves and other children. The children were open and friendly. They talk to each other and even directly to teachers. They will love learning later in life because of good experiences and kind teachers.

Professor Place is lead faculty for all the disciplines having to do with growing things and making biology a life pursuit in a practical way. He is a man who commitment to the highest principles of making each student see his own value. He is proud of his students and knows them by name. He and his students are enterprising and grow some decorative and some edible plants for the market and use the money and the recognition to build the program. We saw a man who is a model for his students in the area of responsible conduct. We all wanted our picture taken with him.

Professor Bert Bitanga was so memorable to us. He spoke with us not only about his studies but how to build a curriculum starting with the syllabus. He has so much enthusiasm for his students and for COD. He loves his subject and his students. Teaching is written in every line of his being. He understood how his subject relates to other subjects, like those taught by the very tall George Brown and Mr. Romero and Mr. Cafferty. He is proud of what they do in the same way he is proud of how his students respond to the challenges of their learning.

Adult Education Block Grant (AEBG) - Last month I reported that the Senate would be consulting with the President's designee, Pam Hunter, on the planning and implementation of College of the Desert's activities funded by the AEBG.

The AEBG focus, as described in the initial legislation AB86, is "...to rethink and redesign an educational system that creates seamless transitions for students across adult schools and community colleges to accelerate academic and career success in order to earn a living wage."

As soon as the Bargaining Agents (full-time and adjunct) and the District have agreed on the wages and conditions of this work, I will be publishing a call for faculty volunteers interested in working on a faculty task force to create a strategy that ensures a comprehensive plan is created for implementation of the AEBG. The Task Force will not be creating the plan but will complete the research necessary to make recommendations for strategies around how to:

- Address gaps in the service area by increasing course offerings in the allowable program areas
 - o Adult Education
 - English as a Second Language
 - o Pre-Apprenticeship Training
 - o Career and Technical Education
 - o Adults training to support child school success
 - o Older Adults in the Workplace
 - Services for Adults with Disabilities
- · Reduce student barriers to education
- Enhance and expand student services
- Evaluate existing college programs
- Identify new or modify existing programs for the Non Credit delivery model

Statewide Vocational Research and Accountability Committee I am pleased to report that I have been selected to represent the Academic Senate of California Community Colleges on the Statewide Vocational Research and Accountability Committee (VERATAC). This committee advises the California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office on the implementation of the accountability provisions in the Carl D. Perkins Act and the Doing What Matters Initiative. In addition, the committee monitors research that focuses on workforce education and other state and national accountability measures that impact workforce education. The next committee meeting is in February. I look forward to representing College of the Desert, CTE Faculty, and the State Academic Senate in this role.

<u>Tutoring and Academic Skills Center</u> - In September, I appointed Karen Tabor and Rick Rawnsley as Co-Chairs, along with Dr. Nery, to a work group charged with developing a recommendation for the TASC structure, services, and staffing etc. for the Senate to consider. The faculty co-chairs were ratified by the All Faculty Senate in September.

Dr. Nery worked with key faculty stakeholders (including Karen Tabor and Rick Rawnsley) to develop a job description for the Director of TASC. A hiring committee was formed. The Senate appointed Karen Tabor, Rick Rawnsley, and Ana Stockwell to serve on the committee. Second interviews for this position are being held this week.

Unfinished Business / Outstanding Items

<u>Re-alignment</u> — Last spring, Dr. Kinnamon sent out a draft re-alignment plan of academic units. There were concerns about the plan and the process under which it was developed. In response to these concerns, Dr. Kinnamon put the plan on pause. While most faculty agree that pausing the plan until further dialogue could occur was a good idea, now that 7 months have elapsed, faculty would appreciate an update.

Administrative Retreat Rights – California Education Code 87458 provides for retreat rights to educational administrators. The same section of Ed Code stipulates that the process for granting retreat rights needs to be jointly agreed upon by boards and the faculty Senate. No such process exists at College of the Desert. I advised the Board in my report of 9/18/2015 that Ed Policies was planning to work on this matter.

Last month, I formally requested that the Board of Trustees or its designee work with the Senate to develop a mutually agreed upon policy for educational administrators' retreat rights and I repeat that request today.

The Faculty Association has worked collaboratively with the HR and the Senate this month to sign MOU's related to pay for faculty on Hiring Committees work during the break. We have also signed an MOU for a faculty Task Force for the Adult Basic Education Grant.

The faculty also met with the District for Bargaining.

The Articles in the Contract discussed at Bargaining are: Article 8: Compensation, Article 10: Benefits, Article 12: Hours of Service and Article 13: Release/Reassigned Time and Stipends. The District has brought Article 14: Distance Learning.

The District's SOLE proposal as to Salary Schedule is to add longevity steps for years of service 15, 20, 25 for those faculty members in Column VI and VII. Members in other Columns would receive nothing.

The District's proposal fails to honor a significant number of faculty- many of whom have been at COD the longest!

Half of all the Faculty at College of the Desert are on the last step. Faculty get ready to make your voices heard.

THE BARGAINING TEAM'S PROPOSAL: SALARY INCREASE ACROSS ALL COLUMNS AND STEPS FOR ALL FACULTY.

In response to the District's proposal the Faculty Association is launching- the COLA + plus campaign.

Look for more information soon.

COLA + plus is the proposal for Health and Welfare Benefits.

Progress is being made with Article 12 and 13. The Bargaining Team has proposed additional release time for the Senate and The District has requested more information, which will come back to the table next session.

The District's proposal on Distance Learning is being studied by the Bargaining Team and may include surveying online faculty.

The Bargaining Team and the District will meet again on January 12th.

We look forward to a productive discussion on prioritizing General Fund money.


All the issues that we have grieved or thought we would have to grieve have been resolved with a minimum of fuss and great fairness.



Partial Campus Master Plan



















































Hilb: As-Built West Elevation










Hilb: window infill options - perforated skin








Hilb: window infill options - aluminum grill









