V. PUBLIC UPDATES

President Kinnamon announced on October 13th at 9:00 a.m. the College of The Desert will be hosting an open house at the Edward L Wenzlaff Center in Desert Hot Springs, which is the college's new site offering classes. He also reported:

- Great progress is being made with the City of Indio for the expansion of facilities at the Indio site.
- The November ballot issue will determine how we proceed with other plans.
- The college's FTES has increased significantly and have been notified by the Chancellor's Office that we are proceeding with becoming a center at Indio, which will provide additional monetary resources at that site.
- We are in possession of the telescope, which will be part of an observatory we will be building at the Mecca/Thermal campus.

Chair Sanchez-Fulton introduced Melissa Rowe, who read the Proclamation for National Disabilities Week.

- 1. Eden Mitry spoke on behalf of herself and the other golf center employees and reported how pleased they are that now they are permanent District employees.
- 2. Itai Cardona explained his credentials and has been appointed as Chairperson of the Human Rights Committee in Desert Hot Springs by the Mayor. He noted that Trustee Sanchez-Fulton attended a forum that was held to present to the young people the opportunities and activities Desert Hot Springs provides and she shared the pathways and scholarship opportunities available to students. Following acknowledgement of the California Teachers Associations proposal and approval of the District's amended initial proposal, representatives from CTA and the District will meet and negotiate their respective proposals.

3. Initial Proposal, Public Hearing, and Acknowledgement of Proposal from California School Employees Association Chapter 407 to Desert Community College District

A public hearing was opened.

Lauro Jimenez, California School Employees Association's Chapter #407 President addressed the Board. He stated that CSEA does not agree that any reopeners are occurring, but rather has demanded to bargain the effects of the District's unilateral changes and is concerned the District is again demonstrating bad faith with CSEA and lack of transparency with the Board, forcing them to consider filing with PERB. The way the unions demand to bargain with COD has been presented in this Board packet is typical of a larger pattern. We only recently reached agreements for two unfair practice charges and only two months ago the administration attended training on EERA given by PERB as a result of one of the settlements. Sadly that training seems to not have had the intended affect.

Please note that the settlement agreement reached in 2014 includes a stipulation that COD will honor the settlement agreement from 2013, which the District has failed to honor and is again

failing to honor. COD is required by law to bargain in good faith and to support agreements reached in good faith. When the administration has moments with agreements already reached with CSEA or any other union and wants to change them, they are required by law to give us prior written notice and an opportunity to bargain. In all cases we do not feel it is too much to expect that administrators support their agreements and send them to the Board for approval or rejection. What they say they will do, they will do and keep their word. This is not to say that the Board does not have the right, and actually has a responsibility to review those agreements just as our Chapter has the same privilege and right. But you have to be able to see those. And we did complete such an MOU and it was signed by the agents of the District to move to CVT.

To this date the Board has not seen such an MOU. And this MOU was signed back in June 2016. Rather than moving forward in good faith with us the administration's recent actions are incurring yet more avoidable legal costs. Incredibly, rather than making sure the members are not hurt by the recent actions, COD is now demanding language concessions. In the amended proposal we appreciate it has changed in terms of the reserve amounts and is much appreciated.

Still we have a question about the cost of health and welfare and how that has changed.

The Health and Welfare Committee had looked at CVT, which offered better plans for less money. The only choice now is to stay with SISC. SISC has the same level of plans as CVT, however, to have these the costs are significantly more each month. This is the issue of concern.

XIV. FUTURE AGENDA ITEMS

Trustee Broughton asked for a resolution encouraging students to vote for the next meeting.

Trustee Sanchez-Fulton asked for an update on enrollment numbers for the Desert Hot Springs Edward Wenzlaff Center, as well as the fall numbers. Dr. Kinnamon asked Drs. Nery and Ralston to update the members now. Dr. Nery said the FTES are up approximately 4%, as are enrollments. Dr. Nery credited the instructional teams and Dr. Ralston, as efficiencies are difficult to achieve at a high rate, and our efficiencies are in the high 80 percentile.

Dr. Ralston reported enrollments are at 29,509, which is up 3% over last fall. FTES calculations for credit apportionment is 3,809, which is up 4% over last fall. We know non-credit will also be up, but that is calculated at the end of the term.

Our overall fill rate is:

- School of Math and Sciences was close to 100%
- School of Social Sciences and Arts we are above 90%
- School of Communications is approximately 90%
- School of Health Sciences and Education is well above 80%
- School of Applied Sciences and Business are 80%

It is not likely there are other colleges doing this well.

Dr. Nery credited the instructional teams again. There were two First Year Experience cohorts held and both were completely full.

XV. ADJOURN

Chair Sanchez adjourned the meeting in honor and memory of Dr. Anne Saddington, Emeritus Faculty of Human Services and Sociology, who passed away on August 30, 2016. Dr. Saddington began working at College of the Desert in August 1995 as a Professor of Human Services and taught Sociology until her retirement in 2011. She is a graduate from Point Loma High School, attended the University of Colorado and received her Ph.D. in Comparative Culture from the University of California Irvine.

INITIAL PROPOSAL, PUBLIC HEARING, AND ADOPTION OF

PROPOSAL FROM THE DESERT COMMUNITY

COLLEGE DISTRICT (DCCD) TO THE COLLEGE OF THE DESERT

FACULTY ASSOCIATION (CODFA)

BACKGROUND:

Government Code section 3547 requires that all initial proposals for collective bargaining must be presented at a public meeting of the public school employer. This is commonly known as "sunshining" initial bargaining proposals.

The District's initial proposal to the College of the Desert Faculty Association is agendized as a public document, see below. At the Board of Trustee's meeting on September 16, 2016, there will be a public hearing on the District's initial proposal to the College of the Desert Faculty Association, and the public will have the opportunity to express itself regarding the proposal in the form of public comments.

Following adoption of the District's initial proposal, representatives from the College of the Desert Faculty Association and the District will meet and negotiate regarding health benefit proposals.

ARTICLE 10: HEALTH AND WELFARE BENEFITS

DISTRICT'S INITIAL PROPOSAL TO COLLEGE OF THE DESERT FACULTY ASSOCIATION RE: HEALTH AND WELFARE BENEFITS

September 16, 2016

- 1. The medical, dental, vision, and life plans to be offered eligible employees for insurance years 2016-17 and 2017-18 will be similar to the plans offered through SISC for the current 2015-16 insurance year (Oct 1 through Sept 30).
- 2. The current District cap for actives will be \$1,400 per month (annual cap of \$16,800) for eligible unit members. Insurance premiums in excess of the District cap will continue to be paid through monthly employee payroll deductions.

- 3. The District will provide at least one medical plan for which there is no premium cost for eligible employees and their eligible dependents during insurance years 2016-17 and 2017-18.
- 4. Plans for eligible retirees will mirror active plans and contributions.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS:

Budgetary implications are subject to employee enrollment and negotiations.

RECOMMENDATION:

Recommendation No. 1: It is recommended that the Board of Trustees conduct a public hearing on the District's INITIAL PROPOSAL TO COLLEGE OF THE DESERT FACULTY ASSOCIATION REGARDING HEALTH AND WELFARE BENEFITS.

Recommendation No. 2: Having conducted the Public Hearing, it is recommended that the Board of Trustees vote to "adopt" the District's initial proposal.
