**BUHM 011** Leadership and Management in the Hospitality Industry Units: 3

This course is designed to provide a basic understanding of the hospitality industry while studying in partnership with students in Japan. The class culminates with a two week trip to Japan where students will meet with hospitality industry leaders to compare and contrast how the hospitality industry is viewed in the USA vs. Japan.

and relationships with other artists and staff.

Topics covered include the design process, research methods, the study and execution of property construction, upholstery, molding, and casting. This course will also introduce students to the various facets of properties, as they relate to a Properties Master and a Properties Artisan or Designer.

Previously learned nursing principles will be used as building blocks to plan holistic care and promote optimal wellness. Program concepts of professionalism, evidenced-based practice, holistic client-centered care, communication, and safety are integrated throughout the course. Students must be concurrently enrolled in NRN 120C and NRN 120L. Prerequisite: 110 and 110C

Learning will take place in various clinical settings. A materials fee of \$70.00 - \$110.00 is required for this course to cover lab learning activities. Students must be concurrently enrolled in NRN 120 and 120L.Prerequisite: 110 and 110C

## MATH 372 Preparation for Beginning Algebra-Noncredit

This is a noncredit course focusing on the elementary operations required for algebra. Topics include adding, subtracting, multiplying, and dividing integers, decimals, fractions, and mixed numbers; the concept and uses of variables; percent's, ratios, rates, and proportions; the metric and American systems of measurement, including the conversion of units; simplifying algebraic expressions; and concepts from elementary geometry such as perimeter, area, and volume. (Noncredit In-class Hours: 108)

## MATH 374 Beginning Algebra-Noncredit

This is a noncredit course on beginning algebra that focuses on the real number system and the use of algebraic expressions, equations, and inequalities in problem solving. Topics include properties of the real numbers; square roots; arithmetic of algebraic expressions including polynomials and polynomial fractions (rational expressions); solving linear equations and inequalities in one variable; factoring polynomials; the Cartesian coordinate system; and equations and graphs of linear equations in two variables. The proper use of math notation and precise language is emphasized. Application problems will include those using basic geometric formulas, the Pythagorean Theorem, and various phenomena that can be modeled with algebraic expressions, equations, and/or inequalities. (Noncredit In-class Hours: 108)

Introduction to the concepts, applications, and historical references related to three-dimensional design and spatial composition, including the study of the elements and organizing principles of design as they apply to three-dimensional space and form. Development of a visual vocabulary for creative expression through lecture presentations and use of appropriate materials for nonrepresentational three-dimensional studio projects

Introduction to drawing the human figure from observation using a wide variety of drawing media and techniques. Topics include an introduction to human anatomy and the historical and contemporary roles of figure drawing in the visual arts. Students in this course will learn both descriptive and interpretive approaches to drawing the figure. This is a basic course in the study of the human figure from a model. Composition and expressive aspects of gesture, weight, and line on a beginning level are investigated through study of the human figure using pencil and charcoal exercises.

Emphasis is placed on the food handler's responsibility in maintaining high sanitation and safety standards. An exam fee of \$60 is required for students interested in achieving industry certification. Note: No credit for CART 060 if a student has successfully completed CART 001

This course is designed to teach proper techniques and approaches to volume catering, including safe handling and transportation. Students will participate in lab assignments that could include both on-site and off-site events. (Noncredit In-class Hours: 32-81)

Students will participate in lab assignments that could include both on-site and off-site events. (Noncredit In-class Hours: 32-81)

Students will develop counseling and communication skills and apply these skills in diverse drug and alcohol treatment programs. Students will master the 12 core functions of substance abuse counseling and apply these skills. The course consists of Internships/clinical fieldwork experience at drug and alcohol treatment programs. Internships are a required component of the HSAD Certificate and Degree Program.

## N 003A Concepts of Nursing Practice - Complex Alterations in Health

Units: 9

Previously learned principles of medical surgical nursing will be built upon in this course. Nursing 3A focuses on promoting, maintaining or restoring health of clients with alterations in psychological and/or physiological functioning. Specific topics covered in this course include men's and women's health, health alterations in respiratory and cardiac systems, conditions of immune response, and psychosocial alterations impacting individuals and families. Clinical experiences will include both inpatient and community-based settings. A materials fee of \$80 - \$175 \$80.00 - \$120.00 is required for this course to cover lab learning activities.

## EMR 387 AHA Basic Life Support (BLS) Healthcare Provider

The goal of the Basic Life Support (BLS) Course is to train healthcare providers students to save the lives of victims in cardiac arrest through high-quality CPR as individuals or as part of a team. The College offers an Associate of Science Degree in Interaction Design, as well as courses leading to transfer. Course work in this pathway lays the foundation for student-success as the first step toward successful entry into the labor market. Interaction Design curriculum prepares students for entry-level positions in web design and development, creative coding, front-end web, and mobile application design, interaction design, or UX (User Experience) design. Interaction design students apply industry-standard user experience strategies to the development of effective information architecture, intuitive user interfaces, and compelling interactive content. Utilizing research, experience mapping, wire-framing, usability testing, and other strategies, students use empathy to develop strong digital products. Students utilize visual communication and technology to create interactive experiences on a wide variety of digital platforms. The diverse body of work is refined into a strategic professional portfolio aimed at accomplishing each student's educational and employment goals.

## **Physical Therapy Assistant AS Degree**

The Physical Therapist Assistant program prepares students for employment as physical therapist assistants (PTA). The PTA functions through the direction of a physical therapist (PT) to implement the PT's plan of care. The ultimate goal of physical therapy is to aid patients and clients in their return to maximal function. PTA students are instructed in thinking processes and skills such as therapeutic exercise, orthopedic and neurological interventions, therapeutic modalities, and the art of patient care. In addition to patient treatment courses, students study the basic sciences of anatomy, physiology, clinical pathology, and kinesiology. Clinical education experiences are integrated throughout the curriculum and offer students the opportunity to practice the techniques learned and practiced each semester. Students can complete the program in two years. ## **Graphic Design Certificate of Achievement**

The Graphic Design Certificate of Achievement curriculum prepares students for entry-level positions in the field of graphic design, digital media, content creation, UX design, interaction design, web design, motion graphics, photography, animation, and video production. The skills covered include production processes, design thinking, project management, and collaborative teamwork. The program stresses design thinking processes as well as the professional and production methods used currently in industry. This program provides students with a comprehensive hands-on education that prepares them to earn industry-standard certifications. Students emerge with design practices to develop and produce marketing materials for their professional portfolio. Students develop a portfolio from projects that require written, oral, and visual presentations. The program also places an emphasis on creativity, design skills, digital portfolios, project management, problem-solving, global teamwork, and entrepreneurship options.
