Lecture	Instructor will present and lecture on basic new vocabulary and how it is used across various content areas by providing examples, visuals and explanation.			
Discussion	Instructor will provide basic, level-appropriate prompts and questions derived from course content topics for students to discuss with one another in pairs, small groups and as a whole class. Instructor with facilitate discussions and provide feedback on correct vocabulary use and pronunciation.

Role Playing	Instructor will provide scripted basic short dialogs for students to role play.
