Methods of Instruction

Method	Please provide a description or examples of how each instructional method will be used in this course.
Demonstration, Repetition/Practice	Instructor will introduce new vocabulary and model correct pronunciation. Students will repeat new vocabulary aloud, and with guidance and feedback from instructor, practice using the new vocabulary in conversations with their peers and in short presentations.
Lecture	Instructor will present and lecture on new vocabulary and how it is used across various content areas by providing examples, visuals, and explanations.
Discussion	Instructor will provide prompts and questions derived from course content topics for students to discuss with one another in pairs, small groups and as a whole class. Instructor will facilitate these discussions and provide feedback on correct vocabulary use and pronunciation.
Role Playing	Instructor will provide scripted short dialogues for students to role play. Students will also role play through more open prompts that ask students to orally respond to scenarios likely to happen in real-life.
Participation	Instructor will guide and facilitate student participation throughout class lectures, demonstrations, discussions and role-play activities.

Group activity participation/observation	Students will be evaluated based on how active their oral participation is during group activities such as role-playing and discussions. In addition, students will be evaluated on how well they follow the established group-work norms.	In and Out of Class
Oral and practical examination	Students will be evaluated on their oral communication skills using level-appropriate metrics and rubrics. These metrics include oral fluidity, as well as the accuracy of students' vocabulary use, grammar, and pronunciation.	In and Out of Class
Presentations/student demonstration observations	Students will be evaluated on a short, two-minute individual presentation they will give on a course content topic. Preparation and practice for this student presentation will be done outside of class.	In and Out of Class
Student participation/contribution	Students will be evaluated on the quantity and quality of their participation during group, discussion, presentation, and role play activities.	In and Out of Class
Mid-term and final evaluations	Students will be evaluated through level-appropriate mid-term and/or final exams that assess oral communication skills, including the accuracy of students' vocabulary use, grammar, and pronunciation.	In and Out of Class
