Full-time history teachers at COD are teaching 5 classes a semester. Currently the cap for student enrollment is at 50 giving each instructor 250 students minimum per semester. In order to maintain the rigor required for articulation and assign written work such as essays and research papers, including returning it with feedback in a timely manner, class sizes must be lowered.
