Initial Intake and Case Management: Administration requirements for admission; interpersonal dynamics and their potential influence on client behavior (e.g. family functioning relationships, and relationships with authority figures; the normal range of vital signs and symptoms of physical disabilities; activities that bring services, agencies, resources, or people together within a planned framework of action toward the achievement of established goals.
- c. Initial Assessment: Information needed to complete intake interview, alcohol/drug history; educational background; vocational information; cultural information; socioeconomic information; living situation; medical status; strengths and weaknesses; problems and needs for development of a treatment plan.
- d. Orientation: General nature and goals of the program; rules governing client conduct and infractions that can lead to disciplinary action or discharge from the program; hours during which services are available in a nonresidential program; treatment cost to be borne by client, if any; client's rights.
- e. Recovery Planning: The components of a recovery plan; problem-solving models and processes; theories and behavioral contracting, the stages of recovery from alcoholism and other drug dependencies how to identify and rank problems needing resolution; realistic and unrealistic treatment goals at various stages of recovery; the value of participant concurrence/expressed disagreement in the therapeutic process; how to organize client information for presentation to professional colleagues; case presentation procedures.

f. Reports and Record-keeping: Charting the results of the assessment and treatment plan; writing reports, progress notes,

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discharge summaries and other client-related data.
