Methods of Instruction

Other	An agency supervisor evaluates supervised interns for each rotation. These evaluations are shared with the Practicum/Internship Supervisor. The Practicum/Internship Supervisor shares agency evaluations with supervised interns. The Practicum/Internship Supervisor and the intern discuss and make adjustments as necessary.2. All documentation of hours must be entered on a weekly basis. At the end of the semester, students must have completed a minimum of 128 hours practicing the 12 Core Functions of an addiction counselor. (10-11 hours in each of the functions)	In and Out of Class
Student participation/contribution	Students will discuss individually and in small groups, various topics covered in the class.	In and Out of Class
