This course provides a solid foundation in practical journalism skills. Through in-class discussion, writing assignments, field trips to local newsrooms and completing several published news stories, students learn news judgment, fairness, the language and style of journalism, how to construct news leads, how to organize and structure news stories, the process of information gathering, interviewing and a basic overview of the laws and ethics of journalism. These basics are relevant for multimedia reporting including print, broadcast, internet and social media journalists.

b. Class Schedule Course Description:

This is a beginning course in news writing and reporting that provides a solid foundation in practical journalism skills. Included in the course are such topics as what is news, fairness, the language and style of journalism, how to write leads, how to organize and structure news stories, interviewing, ethics and multimedia reporting.

a. Out-of-class Assignments

- 1. Write a minimum of five news stories for The Chaparral consisting of 2 hard news stories, 2 feature stories and 1 editorial.
- 2. Complete 14 weekly chapter assignment. These assignments include work that evaluates the students' news judgment, interview preparation, fact checking, story organization, covering a local elected body, court case, etc.)
- 3. Read assigned chapters in textbook
- 4. Read a local newspaper daily.

b. In-class Assignments

Students will be guided through several group/discussion textbook assignments after each lecture in class. Some of the topics include, news judgement, writing leads, feature writing, fact-checking, sources, story organization etc.

- 13. Methods of Evaluating Student Progress: The student will demonstrate proficiency by:
 - College level or pre-collegiate essays
 Students will write five news articles for the college newspaper, The Chaparral including 2 hard news stories, 2 feature stories and 1 editorial.
 - Written homework

Students will complete weekly assignments that will test their understanding of the textbook chapters and lectures. Assignment topics include news judgment, lead writing, interviewing, using quotations, finding credible sources, fact-checking, etc.

• Mid-term and final evaluations

One mid-term exam testing the student's knowledge of the associated press stylebook and one final exam covering textbook knowledge and class lectures.

 - Students will be required to read a daily newspaper to discuss current news events in class and to be prepared for a possible pop current events quiz.
- Student preparation
 - Students will be required to read a daily newspaper or online news source and/or watch a television newscast to discuss current events in class and to be prepared for a possible pop current events quiz.
