This is a continuation course of Japanese 1. In this interactive course, students use listening, reading, speaking and writing at a complex level. The students further develop their Japanese proficiencies at the Novice high to Novice mid range of the ACTFL Proficiency Guidelines. As articulated in Standards for Foreign Language Learning in the 21st Century, the course also prepares students to be able to demonstrate their proficiencies across the three communication modes: interpretive, interpresonal, and presentational.

In addition to *communication*, the 5 C's of the National Standards for Japanese Language Learning are integrated in instruction. The student will through the coursework to cover the area of cultural competence, connections to other disciplines, comparisons between the Japanese language and culture and those of the students, and the use of the language in multilingual communities beyond the school setting.

- Travel: Public transportation; the car (parts, at the mechanic's); planning a trip (purchasing the tickets, obtaining a passport and visas, reserving lodging); asking for, following and giving directions; Travel experiences (clearing customs, banking, the Post Office, using the telephone, shopping, eating, social, cultural activities)
- Courtesies and customs: Making suggestions, influencing others, understanding and giving direct and indirect commands
- Health and illnesses: Parts of the body; states of health (physical and emotional); health maintenance and health professions; appointments and visits to the doctor, dentist, hospital and pharmacy; accidents and emergencies.

  - a. Identify sound and meaning in Japanese at a novice-high level, building on already acquired skills of the level-1 by answering questions orally, in writing and in recognition exercises.
  - b. Express immediate needs, ask questions or make statements using slightly longer learned utterances either orally or in writing.
  - c. Describe basic life situations by using the grammatical structures of Japanese, introduced in the previous semester with increased accuracy, as well as apply the newer structures presented in this course.
  - d. Demonstrate comprehension of written work by applying pre-reading strategies, making decisions based on context, answering questions, and expressing an opinion, orally and in writing, in Japanese at a novice-high level.
  - e. Demonstrate broader vocabulary, and recognize and reproduce approximately additional 260 kanji characters in writing and reading.

f. Utilize technology to locate information on topics to produce orally and written responses.

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- g. Discuss and differentiate the Japanese culture from the U.S. culture through music, art, history, culture, politics, social issues and life styles of Japan.
