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Justification / Rationale

The course sociology of sport grew out of a need to address student equity. It is no secret that many of our student athletes struggle in our classes. Moreover, many black and Latino males find it difficult to relate to the subject matter taught in many of the courses as they fail to relate and don't find the course content of interest. Additionally, this class will expand the scope of courses offered in the social sciences and provide students with a quicker path to graduation and transfer. Thus, this new course offering will advance the mission of the college in both the areas of student success and diversity and inclusion.

For student success, the course provides a larger breadth of general education course offerings. For diversity and inclusion, the course and subject matter should interest historically marginalized groups in academia.

Objective 3	Compare and contrast the major sociological perspectives to the the study of sport.		
Objective 4	Utilize sociological research methods to analyze historical and contemporary issues within the discourse of sport.		
Objective 5	Discuss the shifting dynamics of the institution of sport and how these coincide with popular culture.		
Objective 6	Describe existing social problems such as power dynamics, violence, and abuse existent within the institution and propose possible solutions.		
Objective 7	Identify social policies and discuss effects and consequences of the institution of sport at both the micro and macro level.		
Objective 8	Outline central debates within the institution of sport and social factors contributing to these perspectives.

Methods of Instruction

Activity	Student teams will participate in a series of debates around various sociology of sport topics. Points will be given to students during the debate in a debate show type fashion (e.g.: ESPN's Around the Horn).
Collaborative/Team	Groups of students will present a final video project related to a sociology of sport topic chosen by the student group. Students will be required to discuss the cultural and social relevance of the sporting event (e.g. The Berlin Olympics, Collin Kapernick Protest).
Lecture	The instructor will cover various topics related to sociology of sport using power point slides, videos, websites and other supplemental material.
Participation	Students will discuss in small groups various topics covered in the class.
Technology-based instruction	The instructor will show a sports film and other sporting events and require students to reflect and discuss how sports media perpetuates racial stereotypes.

Mid-term and final evaluations	There will be a midterm and a final exam of approximately 50 questions each using true/false multiple-choice and short-answer questions.	In Class Only
College level or pre-collegiate essays	Write a seven-page research paper on a socially and culturally relevant sports moment. Students will discuss the impact, relevance and historical significance of the event.	Out of Class Only
Group activity participation/observation	Student teams will participate in a series of debates around various sociology of sport topics. Moreover, students will discuss in small groups various topics covered in the class.	In Class Only
Presentations/student demonstration observations	Groups of students will present a final video project related to a sociology of sport topic chosen by the student group. Students will be required to discuss the cultural and social relevance of the sporting event (e.g. The Berlin Olympics, Collin Kapernick Protest).	In Class Only
Student participation/contribution	Student teams will participate in a series of debates around various sociology of sport topics. Points will be given to students during the debate in a debate show type fashion (e.g.: ESPN's Around the Horn). Moreover, students will discuss in small groups various topics covered in the class.	In Class Only
Written homework	The students will have weekly two-page homework assignments that require them to critically analyze the weeks readings. There will be approximately 45 pages of reading assigned each week. 25 pages from the main text and 20 pages from the accompanying reader.	Out of Class Only
Tests/Quizzes/Examinations	There will be two exams that will use true/false and multiple choice questions. These exams are separate from the midterm and final.	In Class Only
Term or research papers	Choose a sociologically relevant sports event. They will write a detailed research paper on the event they chose.


