Objective 4	Demonstrate the ability to ask and answer questions aboutpersonal hygiene, meals, parties, personal relationships, stages of life, symptoms and medical conditions, computer and internet, the car and its accessories, and household chores in indicative (present and past) and subjunctive (present) moods.
Objective 5	Investigate the world beyond their immediate environment, framing significant problems and conducting well-craftedresearch.
Objective 6	Recognize perspectives, others' and their own, articulating and explaining such perspectives thoroughly and respectfully.

Methods of Instruction

Discussion	Instructors will provide a variety of prompts and questions for students to answer individually, in pairs or in small groups. The collaborative exchange will allow students to practice vocabulary, grammar, and pronunciation.				
Demonstration, Repetition/Practice	Instructors will model the correct use of grammar and vocabulary. Instructors will demonstrate the correct pronunciation of vocabulary. Instructors will also provide ample practice opportunities during discussions, role playing, and presentations.				



Role Playing	Instructors will provide students prompts to create and act out dialogues and simulate real-life situations.
Participation	Instructors will give students different participation opportunities including anti-quizzes, class discussions, minute papers, and pair activities.
Lecture	Instructors will lecture on grammar, vocabulary, listening, and reading comprehension. Instructors will also present new vocabulary and cultural content in context with relatable real life situations.

Oral and practical examination	Students will do a midterm and/or final presentation in the form of a dialogue with a peer.	In and Out of Class
