3.2 EDGE/plEDGE Update

DISCUSSION

Katie Chartier provided an overview of the EDGE/plEDGE results from last year.

EDGE helps prepare students for college and college-level coursework, such as:

- Expectations on what to find in a college classroom
- How students should interact with their instructors
- Building a support system with faculty and friends before they start their semester here at COD
- The program runs in the summertime

plEDGE provides the students who complete EDGE with free tuition and fees for two years during which time they get a support system of faculty, staff and peer student. They also get priority registration and are provided an opportunity to improve upon and build their English and Math skills to help prepare them.

Enrollment numbers:

2017-2018:

- 1,004 plEDGE students
- 1,250 EDGE/pIEDGE students

2018-2019:

- 1,416 plEDGE students
- 1,598 EDGE/pIEDGE students

Enrollment by Campus:

- Palm Desert 926 students
- Indio 510 students
- Palm Springs 69 students
- Desert Hot Springs 64 students
- Mecca-Thermal 96 students

These programs have resulted in a higher persistence rate from fall to spring, and helping students complete and stay in their classes. These students also complete more units than the first-time college student who did not complete the EDGE program.

3.3 Dual Enrollment

DISCUSSION

Leslie Young and Michelle Bleza attended the California Coalition of Early & Middle Colleges Summit (CCEMC) in Sacramento two weeks ago where they interacted with other colleges that have had dual enrollment programs for a while.

A couple of topics at the conference that resonated with Leslie and Michelle:

- Timelines. Other colleges and high schools are working now on their enrollments and registrations for the spring. Their deadlines for fall semester are in mid-March. We need to work on this
- How important it is to have faculty-to-faculty discussions between the high schools and COD to have a successful program. This connection needs to be reinforced.
- High schools that use programs such as "Get Focused, Stay Focused" and AVID as part of their dual enrollment college prep.
- Everyone is approaching dual enrollment differently across the state.

Our dual enrollment offerings are increasing. The headcount as of yesterday is 600 with two late start classes that will begin at Mt. San Jacinto and Desert Hot Springs high schools.
